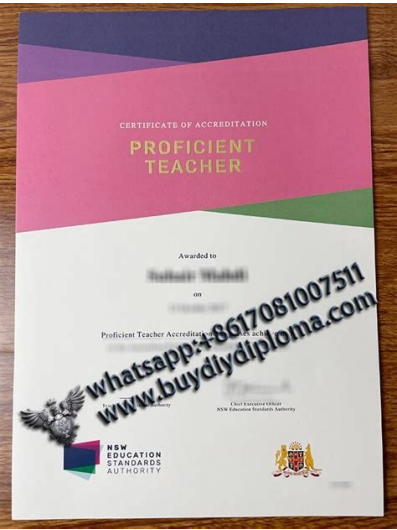

From these discussions the First Aid IRC has advised the Australian Industry and Skills Committee that all reasonable adjustments implemented during the pandemic should be removed before the 1st of September 2022. This means that training and assessment activities undertaken during First Aid and CPR courses will revert to pre-covid conditions.All RTOs delivering first aid training must review this advice which is available in full on the AISC website AISC news.Nearly 1 million students can have their say about their training8 June 2022The National Student Outcomes Survey has now opened for students who completed a VET qualification, program or subject during 2021. This update includes new occupation codes, changes to occupations titles and a realignment of existing codes.NCVER has updated ANZSCO classifications for qualifications and accredited courses to reflect changes, where required. These updates will be published on the National Register on 22 April 2022.More information can be found on the NCVET website here.The reporting period for Quarter 2 2022 can be found on the NCVET website.AISC decision related to transition of First Aid units of competency17 December 2021At their 1 December 2021 meeting, the AISC noted the Australian Skills Quality Authority (ASQA) had agreed to extend the transition period for superseded first aid units by 6 months to 14 April 2022 to allow extra time for Skills Service Organisations and Industry Reference Committees to update all training products that import first aid units to reflect current versions. See AISC Communiqué for more detail.The AISC acknowledged the implementation issues related to superseded first aid units and agreed to support ASQA's decision by allowing training products that specify superseded first aid units as core or prerequisite requirement to be updated through a 'minor change' process which does not require Ministerial endorsement. This expediated process ensures all training products that import first aid units are updated by the new transition deadline and avoids any further delays for the implementation of current first aid competency standards.Important Changes to High-Risk Work Units of Competency in the Transport & Logistics Training Package 25 October 2021The Australian Industry and Skills Committee (AISC) has approved revised Crane High Risk Work (HRW) Units of Competency (units) for referral to Skills Ministers for endorsement.At the request of Safe Work Australia (SWA), the Transport and Logistics Industry Reference Committee (IRC) has revised nine Crane HRW units (listed below) to align with Schedules 3 and 4 of the Model Work Health and Safety Regulations 2011. References in each unit to "a current National HRWL to perform dogging or a certification for a specific VET course for HRWL to perform dogging" have been removed. Further, the reference to "a current National HRWL to operate a Slewing Mobile crane (up to 60 tonnes), and current industry experience operating a slewing mobile crane of between 20 tonnes and up to 60 tonnes competently for at least two years" contained in the units Licence to operate a slewing mobile crane (up to 100 Tonnes) and (over 100 Tonnes) have been removed. While removing references that do not align with regulations, other changes have been made to the units to maintain a focus on safety, including safe slinging and load estimation practices. To facilitate regulatory alignment and timely implementation of these units, the Department of Education, Skills and Employment (DESE) has requested ASQA consider reducing the transition period to 28 February 2022. DESE has also sought an extension to the current transition period for the vehicle loading crane unit TLILIC0012 - Licence to operate a vehicle loading crane (capacity 10 metre tonnes and above) that is set to end on 1 November 2021, to 28 February 2022 to bring these units into alignment.
